### IMPLEMENTATION OF THE CONVENTION ON THE RIGHTS OF THE CHILD List of issues to be taken up in connection with the consideration of the third periodic report of **BOLIVIA** (CRC/C/125/Add.2)

#### <u>Part I</u>

# Under this section the State party is requested to submit in <u>written form</u> additional and updated information, if possible, <u>before 25 November 2004</u>.

## A. Data and statistics, if available

1. Please provide disaggregated data (by gender, age, indigenous and minority groups, urban and rural areas) covering the years 2001, 2002 and 2003 on the:

a) number and proportion of children under 18 living in the State party;

b) number and proportion of children belonging to indigenous, minority, refugee and internally displaced groups.

2. In light of article 4 of the Convention, please provide additional disaggregated data for the years 2002, 2003 and 2004, on budget allocations and trends (in absolute figures and in percentages of the national and regional budgets or GDP) allocated to the implementation of the Convention, evaluating also the priorities for budgetary expenditures given to the following:

a) education (different types of education, i.e. pre-primary, primary and secondary education);

b) health care (different types of health services, i.e. primary health care, vaccination programmes, adolescent health care and other health care services for children);

c) programmes and services for children with disabilities;

d) support programmes for families;

e) support for children living below the poverty line;

f) the protection of children who are in need of alternative care including the support of care institutions;

g) programmes and activities for the prevention of and protection from child abuse, child sexual exploitation and child labour;

h) programmes and services for street children and abandoned children;

i) juvenile justice.

Please also indicate the expenses of the private sector, in particular for health and education.

3. With reference to children deprived of a family environment and separated from parents, please provide disaggregated data (by gender, age groups, indigenous and minority groups, urban, rural and remote areas) for the years 2001, 2002 and 2003 on the number of children:

- a) separated from their parents;
- b) placed in institutions
- c) placed with foster families;
- d) adopted domestically or through inter-country adoptions.

4. Please specify the number of children with disabilities, disaggregated by sex, age and indigenous and minority groups, covering the years 2001, 2002 and 2003:

- a) living with their families;
- b) in institutions;
- c) attending regular schools;
- d) attending special schools; and
- e) not attending any school.

5. With reference to child abuse, please provide disaggregated data (by age, gender, indigenous and minority groups and types of violations reported) for the years 2001, 2002 and 2003 on the:

a) number of individual complaints received per year in the last three years;

b) number and percentage of reports which have resulted in either a court decision or other types of follow-up.

6. Please provide disaggregated data (by gender, age groups, indigenous and minority groups, urban, rural and remote areas) for the years 2001, 2002 and 2003 on:

a) the enrolment and completion rates in percentages of the relevant group in pre-primary schools, in primary schools and in secondary schools;

- b) number and percentage of drop-outs and repetitions;
- c) number and percentage of children not attending school at all;
- d) ratio teacher per children.

7. Please provide disaggregated statistical data (by gender, age groups, indigenous and minority groups, urban, rural and remote areas) on infant and child mortality and malnutrition, early pregnancy, sexually transmitted diseases (STIs), mental health, suicide, drug use, and alcohol and tobacco abuse for the years 2001, 2002 and 2003. Please also provide numbers of health professionals working in the health care services for children.

8. Please provide disaggregated statistical data (including by gender, age groups, indigenous and minority groups, urban, rural and remote areas) on children infected or affected by HIV/AIDS.

9. Please provide appropriate disaggregated data (including by gender, age, indigenous and minority groups, and type of crime) for the years 2001, 2002 and 2003, in particular on the number of:

a) persons below 18 who have allegedly committed a crime, reported to the police;

b) persons below 18 who have been sentenced and type of punishment or sanctions related to offences including length of deprivation of liberty;

c) detention facilities for juvenile offenders (under 18) and their capacity;

d) persons below 18 detained in these facilities and persons below 18 detained in adult facilities;

e) persons below 18 kept in pre-trail detention and the average length of their detention;

f) reported cases of abuse and maltreatment of persons below 18 occurred during their arrest and detention.

10. With reference to special protection measures, please provide statistical data (including by gender, age, urban/rural areas) for the years 2001, 2002 and 2003 on:

a) the number of street children and children involved in sexual exploitation, including prostitution, pornography and trafficking;

b) the number of children involved in sexual exploitation who received rehabilitation treatments;

c) the number of children involved in child labour (formal and informal sectors);

d) the number of unaccompanied minors, asylum-seeking and refugee children;

e) the number of children living in prisons with their parents.

#### **B.** General Measures of Implementation

1. Please provide further information on those recommendations contained in the Committee's previous observations (CRC/C/15/Add.9) which have not yet been fully implemented, in particular those related to conditions of children living in institutions (para. 23), measures taken to address the problem of child labour and street children (para. 28), measures to protect children from sexual exploitation (para. 29), and juvenile justice and conditions of children living in detention centres (para. 30).

2. Please provide information on cases, if any, where the Convention has been directly invoked in the courts, and if so, please provide examples of such cases.

3. Please provide updated information on mechanisms to coordinate policies and programmes on children's rights, including services for children, among relevant departments and ministries and between the central and local levels.

4. Please provide further on the activities of the Office of the Procurator for the Protection of Human Rights in the area of the rights of the child and on measures taken to effectively guarantee and protect the proper functioning of this institution, in line with the Paris Principles (General Assembly resolution 48/134).

5. Please provide further information on progress made and problems encountered in the establishment of ombudspersons (*Defensorías*) for children and adolescents at the local level under the municipal governments.

6. Please provide further information on the plans mentioned in the report (para. 68) to elaborate a new national Plan of Action for Children, which would take into account the conclusions of the 2002 UN General Assembly Special Session on Children, including information on the body which would be charged with overseeing its implementation and on measures to ensure coordination and integration with other ongoing national programmes for children.

7. Please provide additional information on measures taken to improve the system for collection of disaggregated data on children under 18 and all areas under the Convention.

8. Please provide further information on efforts to raise awareness about and provide training and information on the Convention to public officials and the public at large.

9. Please provide information on the existing practice, structures and/or agreements regarding cooperation between the Government and non-governmental organizations involved with the promotion and protection of children's rights.

10. Please indicate the issues affecting children that the State party considers to be priorities requiring the most urgent attention with regard to the implementation of the Convention

#### <u>Part II</u>

Please provide the Committee with copies of the text of the Convention on the Rights of the Child in all official languages of the State party as well as in other languages or dialects, when available. If possible, please submit these texts in electronic form.

## <u>Part III</u>

Measures to strengthen the Convention's implementation with particular attention to the general principles of the Convention: non-discrimination (art. 2); the best interests of the child (art. 3); the right to life, survival and development (art. 6); and the right of the child to be heard (art. 12).

- 2. Birth registration.
- 3. Early childhood development.
- 4. Children with disabilities.
- 5. Children living in institutions, including orphans.
- 6. Children living in penitentiary centres with their parents.
- 7. Alimony and enforcement of decisions concerning maintenance obligations.
- 8. Adoption and protection of children placed in foster care.
- 9. Violence against children, including ill-treatment and corporal punishment.
- 10. Access to quality health care, including issues related to malnutrition and HIV/AIDS.
- 11. Access to quality education.
- 12. Refugee and asylum seeking children.
- 13. Children affected by anti-narcotics interventions and social conflict.
- 14. Economic exploitation, including child workers.
- 15. The situation of street children.
- 16. Drug abuse among children.
- 17. Sexual exploitation and trafficking of children.

18. Juvenile Justice, including alternative forms of sanctions for young offenders.
